# Pennsylvania Community Foundations

A Statistical Snapshot



### SUMMARY

In October of 2023, the Pennsylvania Area Community Foundation Association (PACFA) approached the Community Foundation Research and Training Institute (CFRTI) about preparing a statistical summary of all community foundations in Pennsylvania.

As will be shown on the following pages, 42 foundations with collective assets of more than \$4.6 billion serve Pennsylvania. In 2021 they received gifts totaling \$363 million and awarded grants and scholarships of about \$253 million.

Those community foundations employ 469 staff members and are governed by 576 board members.

Around 23% of community foundation assets across the state are held in donor advised funds. Those donor advised funds received \$165 million in gifts in 2021 (45% of all gifts received) and awarded \$98 million in grants (39% of all grants awarded).

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# STATISTICAL SNAPSHOT OF PENNSYLVANIA COMMUNITY FOUNDATIONS


The State of Pennsylvania is served by more than 40 community foundations.

According to the Form 990 for each foundation, here is summary information for all community foundations:

- Number of Foundations: 41<sup>1</sup>
- Number of Staff Members: 457
- Number of Board Members: 563

The number of board members per foundation can vary significantly – from seven board members (Community Foundation of Warren County) to a high of 28 board members (Bethel Park Community Foundation).

#### STAFFING PATTERNS AT COMMUNITY FOUNDATIONS

As might be expected, the number of staff at Pennsylvania community foundations is generally tied to asset levels – the higher the level of assets, the more staff. The following charts show staffing at all Pennsylvania community foundations, broken down by asset level. This information comes from the Form 990.<sup>2</sup>

For the information provided in this report, we have broken down the data by the size of the foundation. In each subject area, then, we provide not only aggregated data but also data based on the size of the foundation.

The chat below shows the category breakdown. The largest foundations (assets above \$100 million) are in category A; those in the middle (assets between \$30 million and \$100 million), Category B and the smaller foundations (assets below \$30 million) are in Category C.

On the following pages, then, are staffing patterns for community foundations broken down by category. Also shown is a calculation of assets per staff member.

 $<sup>^{2}</sup>$  Note that the Form 990 tends to overstate the number of staff members. Question #5 asks for "number of individuals employed in the calendar year". Thus, if one position has turnover (one staff departs, a new one is hired) that would count as 2 staff, even though they served in only one position.



### ASSET LEVELS AND GROWTH

From 2016 to 2021, asset levels at community foundations in Pennsylvania grew from approximately \$2.8 billion to \$4.7 billion. This is an increase over that time period of about 68%. This growth was slightly less than the nationwide growth of community foundation over this time period, which was about 75%.

### Assets of All Pennsylvania Community Foundations



When looking at assets of all Pennsylvania community foundations, the ten largest foundations are noted below. As shown in the chart, the Pittsburgh Foundation is the largest community foundation in Pennsylvania (\$1.5 billion in assets as of 2021). In 2021, the Pittsburgh Foundation was the 16<sup>th</sup>-largest community foundation in the country.


Following Pittsburgh, the largest community foundations in Pennsylvania are the Philadelphia Foundation (\$669 million in asset), Erie Community Foundation (\$335 million) and York County Community Foundation (\$208 million).



Pennsylvania CFs vs All US CFs




As noted previously, while the overall growth of Pennsylvania community foundations from 2016 to 2021 was 68%, the individual growth rates at difference community foundations varied significantly. As shown below, 17 Pennsylvania community foundations doubled in size (or more) between 2016 and 2021.

When we looked at comparisons of percentage growth in assets, some of the smaller Pennsylvania community foundations had the highest growth rates. While the largest community foundations in Pennsylvania grew at a rate of about 65% between 2016 and 2021, in the smallest category the average growth rate was 94%



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#### DONOR ADVISED FUNDS

A donor advised fund is a fund in which the donor or someone named by the donor can periodically recommend recipients of charitable grants. They have become a very popular giving vehicle in the last ten years.

As of 2021 Pennsylvania community foundations administered 3,816 donor advised funds with assets of nearly \$1.1 billion. This compares to 3,080 accounts in 2016, with assets of \$583 million. This represents a 24% growth in the number of accounts, and an 87% growth in assets in these types of funds.

This growth contrasts, however, with the growth in donor advised funds at commercial donor advised fund providers (such as Fidelity, Schwab, and Vanguard). Donor advised funds have soared at these types of providers – up nearly fivefold from 2016 to 2021.



Interestingly, the average fund size of a donor advised fund at a commercial provider has dipped by nearly half, while the average fund size at a Pennsylvania community foundation is up by more than 50%.

The percentage of community foundation assets held in donor advised funds can differ significantly. Overall, about 23% of Pennsylvania community foundation assets are in donor advised funds. For some community foundations, however, they represent a much higher proportion of assets.
